Jack Wilson gave an update on the Angel Oak Award Banquet: Out of 9 nominees, Dr. Louise Balcom was chosen to receive the award this year on May 15 at Wingate Place. \$100 p/p, only 150 seats available. This is our 2nd biggest fundraiser. Table sponsors are encouraged.

The Ad sales campaign for the Handbook has so far produced 152 contracts for ads in the amount of 120,000. Last year at this time we had 187 worth \$135,000.

At 7:27PM after dinner, John Reock introduced the evening's speakers beginning with Frances Welch, Dean of Education at College of Charleston. She spoke about a Teacher leader program known as Call Me Mister that was established in 2007 and is funded by the SC General Assembly thru Clemson. This academic year there are 14 young men participating and we heard from 4 of them this evening. These minority "Misters" participate in 20 hours of community service in K-12 classrooms to "plant seeds of dignity"* among minority and underprivileged children by encouraging them to stay in school and complete a high school diploma. They serve as mentors, tutors and friends to their charges. They also complete a full time unpaid semester clinical internship. In turn, they receive \$5,000 towards tuition. See attachment.

TRIBUTE TO SC FALLEN HERO

Good evening fellow club members and guests.

Tonight, we're paying tribute to *Army Sargent Demetrius L. Void.

Army Sargent Demetrius L. Void was born on April 18, 1989. He was focused on academics in high school. He never shied away from asking for help and had a competitive nature. His math teacher said he "He kept at it until he figured out that calculus." Void was active in the JROTC at Orangeburg-Wilkinson High School. After graduating at the age of 18, Demetrius L. Void followed his family's tradition of military service and enlisted in the U.S. Army, where he served as an information systems operator and analyst. He was assigned to the 57th Expeditionary Signal Battalion, 11th Signal Brigade, III Corps at Fort Hood, Texas.

Army Sargent Demetrius L. Void deployed to Afghanistan in April, 2009 and his family expected him to come home in December for a two-week break. However, on Sept. 15, 2009, Army Sargent Demetrius L. Void of Orangeburg, S.C., was struck by an armored vehicle while conducting physical training. The vehicle that struck him never stopped. At the age of 20, Army Sargent Demetrius L. Void died while serving during Operation Enduring Freedom.

The incident changed the lives of those who knew Void. On February 19, 2010, U.S. Army Soldiers gathered at Kandahar Air Field, Afghanistan to honor the life of Army Sgt. Demetrius L. Void. In a ceremony dedicated to their fallen comrade, the road where the vehicle struck Void was renamed *'Sgt. Demetrius Void Lane'.

Also in response to the tragic event, the North Atlantic Treaty Organization commanders moved fast to prevent any recurrence through road safety improvements, pedestrian crosswalks, night lights in visually impaired areas, and the help of military police, who diligently enforced traffic rules and regulations.

His uncle said "I'm proud, it makes you feel proud. It gives you a sense that he didn't die in vain and his death was appreciated by the military and by this country. I'm just grateful that he would be remembered that way".

As an indication of our respect for Army Sgt. Demetrius L. Void and others who gave their lives for our country, the club *places US flags around our community several times a year. Each flag has a yellow ribbon attached with the name of a fallen hero.

Army Sgt. Demetrius L. Void, we salute you and your sacrifice on our behalf.

Please stand as you are able and join me in reciting the pledge of allegiance.
